

Att a towne meeting upon the eight & twentyeth day of Sept there was granted to Leiftenant John Gilman that parcell of upland lying between Griffin Mountaue lot abovesaid and the Creek which divided between Mr Hiltons land and the Towne of Exeter

Towne of Exeter, have taken a veiw of the lotts, betwene the parting brook of Mr Hiltons and the towne of Exeter, begining our station at the towne side of the 29th lot which was granted to Mr Wheelright and measured through it and left 80 acres, and through Robert Reade lot 9 acres and fyfty pole, and Mr Stors lot twenty acres one hundred pole and Griffin 10 acres & fyfty pole which was the last lot, and then lays the rest to John Gilman Senior, according to what was granted in begining at the high way, marking a sloping white oak on the right hand marked with H and so is the senth saxtward tooke our station eastward downe to Jonathan Things meadow & marked a tree, and then run a line six score rod west, & marked a tree in a little swamp\*, & so from thence a north line till we met Mr Hiltons line upon the hill on the north side of the brook and marked a great white oake layd out by Ralph Hall for Exeter.

I, Edward Gilman, was at the laying out of this land when Lieutenant Hall and my uncle Folsom layd wax it out for my uncle Gilman, witness my hand.

Theire is also divided 14 acers to ye Sayd partys at Lamprome River & the Same p portion to each party as aboue Sayd,

1: Impr to James Walls one acre & 54 poole bee it more or lesse & halfe an acree at Lamprone River,

- 2: To Mr Morris 7 acres bee it more or lesse & 2 acres 40 poole at L: Riuer,
- 3: To Goodm: Willson 3 acres 28 poole bee it more or lesse & 1 acre a Lam: Riuer,
- 4: To Mr Grosse 6 acres 50 poole bee it more or lesse & 2 acres a Lam: Riuer,

In the Third Diuission 18 acres on this side Mr Hiltons & six acres at Lamprone River divided & given as before as followeth

In the 4th Diuission 19 acres on this side Mr Hiltons & 14 acers at Lamp: Riuer diuided & given to them that have noe cattle, & to every man an equall p portion wch comes to every one an acer & a halfe.

Theire is a small parcell about 2 acers of marsh bee it more or lesse weh was given to William Winborne than lyeth betwixt Mr Needums march & theire marsh W weh had noecattle betwixt this and Mr Hiltons.

A note of what medows have bene found by Sundrey of ye Inhabatants of Exeter since the order made in ye 21 da of Agust: 43:

found by Samuel Grenfeld and Nathaniel Boulter two parcels lieinge westward from ye towne by estemation 19 akars Apece found ye first of May 1644

found by Robart Bouth one parcil westward from ye towne by estemation 30 Akars which is in the towns hands to be lotted out if Mr Whelwright does not coom to live im at Exeter again.

found by Jams Walls & Ralph Hall 2 parcills both of them by estemation 3 Akars.

## ye 8th of June 46

Goodman Smart hath granted unto him formerly wch was not booked all the marsh wch ys att Stony Brooke on both sides of the brooke: and ther is 4 Akers of upland wch lyeth on both sides of the sd marsh wch Goo(dman) Smart bought.

Certaine ord made at the Co houlden in Exeter the 4th day of the first weake in the 10th Month, 1639

- Imprimis. That Mr Edward Hilton his vpland ground is bounded in Breadth from the Creeke next from his house towards Exeter on the one side & a Certaine point of Land ov against Captaine Wiggins his howse between the Mash and the vpland that his bounds one the oth side and it is to extend into the maine the same distance in Length as it is in Breadth, and that he shall have all the meadows we'h hee formerly ocupied from his howse to the mouth of Lamprell River.
- That all the Meadowes wich belonge unto the Toune of Exeter, leying betweene the Townes and Mr Hiltons howse, as Likewise the Meadowes from Lamprell River unto the head of the little Baye shall be equally devided into fouer parts whereof the 4<sup>th</sup> pte shall be devided by Lott to such of the inhabitants of the Towne of Exeter as have noe Cattle or fower Goates, and the profitt of the haye wich growes thereupon shall bee devided amongst them wich have the other pts ontill such tyme as they have Cattle of there owne or that they sell the Grounds to those that have Cattles.
  - 3dLy That the three othr pts shall bee equally devided amongst those that have Cattle, to each head of Cattle there pportion to bee devided to each of them by(lott) weh devisions are to bee made betwixt this and the next Cote.
- Ath Lye That all the inhabitants of the Towne of Exeter shall have yr vpland lotts for planting laid out by the Riv bettweene Stony Creeke and the Creeke on this side Mr Hiltons, according to the num of y psons and Cattle, in equall prortion went prortion is to be devided to them by lott, except such psons as live one the oth side the Riv and Will. Hilton and Goodm. Smart who are to have the lotts one the oth side the Riv where the Toune shall bee thought most Convenient, By o Rul Needam and Mr Starre deputeis to this purpose.
  - 5th Lye That whosever shall Carry themselves disorderly unreverently in the Cote Towards the Magistrates or in yr presence shall bee lyable to such a Censer as the Coteshall thinks meete.

The first day of 8th m. 1640

It is ordered and Agreed vppon by the inhabitanc of the Towns of Exeter that noone shall fell Aney Oke timber wthin halfe A mile of Aney part of the Towns, Except it be vppon there pticular lott or for building or fenceing, vppon the penialltie of (each tree?) five shillings.

Its ordered by the Inhabitance of the Towne at A (meeting) that whosever shall Absent themselves from Towne (meeting) (after) due warning shall for each offence forfeit--

Orders made by the Cote held at Exeter the 6 Day of the 12 Mo. 1639

That noe man shall sett fier upon the wood, to the destroying of the feed for the Cattle, or to the doing of any oth hurt und paine of payeing the damage that shall insue thereby, after the midle of the 2 month.

That every man shall fall such trees as are in his lott being offencive to any oth<sup>r</sup>. And if aft<sup>r</sup> due warninge any shall refuse, to pay halfe a Crowne for every tree that is see offensive.

That every action that is tried the pty that is Cast in it shall pay to the Jury foure shillings

Orders made by the Co<sup>te</sup> held at Exeter the 6 day of the 1 mo<sup>th</sup> (1639-40)

That noe wines or stronge watter shal be Sould by retaile to the English but by thomas Wardle.

yt is ordered that whosever shall dige a saw pitt & shall not fill it or Cover it, shal be liable to pay the damage that shall com to man or beast thereby.

yt is ordered that all the swine that is not cared (carried) doune the river by the 4 day of the 2 month, the owners shall be liable to pay the damage that shall befall any therby

That all grounds woods & such previliges as appertaine to the towne such inhabitans as have their letter have shall be liable to pay such comon Charges as the towne shall be at, according to their e proportion of ground Catles or other preuilidges they doe injoye in ye towne whither present or absent.

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- 5. It is furder ordered that everie man that is an inhabitant in the towne shall have free libirtie to trade with the Indians in any thinge exsepte it be powder shot or any ware like weapons or Sacke or other Stronge watters according to the former order, and as for prizes of what Corne there shalbe traided with them shall not exceed foure Shillimgs the bushell.
- 6. It is here recorded that Anthonie Stanyon hath satisfied the Cort Conserneinge the offence given by hime to our Ruler Nedham.

### An ordered & inacted law

That if any person or persons shall plot or practise eyther by Combination or otherwise the betrayeing of his Contrie or any prinsipall part thereof into the hands of any forrainge state, Spanish Duch or french, Contrarye to the Allegiance we p fesse & owe to our Dread Souveraigne lord Kinge Charles his heires & Successors it being his majesties pleasuer to ptect vs his loyall Subjecta, shalbe punished with death. if anye person or persons shall plot or practise Trecherge treson or rebellion, or shall revile his majestie the lords analytical subjects. anoynted Contrarye to the Allegiance we professe and owe to our dread Souveraine lord kinge Charles his heires & successors (ut supra) shalbe punished with death.

Numb.16 Exo. 22.28 1 Kings, 2.8.9.44.

It is inacted for a law constituted & made & consented unto by the whole assemblye at the Cort sollomly meet togeather in Exeter this 9 day of the 2 moneth Ano. 1640.

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Orders mayd by the Cort at Exeter houlden the secund day moth 9th, 1640

Impr yt Edward Rishwoorth is chosen by order of Cort to be Secritery to the Cort to looke to the booke & to enter all such actions are brought and to have 12d layd downe at the entring every action.

- 21y Its likewise agreed upon yt the lands yt are layd outt according to the former order both for theire butting, bounding & p portion are now confirmed & ratifyd in the cort Rowles.
- 3ly It is a lawe mayd yt if either pson or psons shall by any means draw sids, to make comuotions or seditions in these or Jurisdictions hee shall pay tenn pounds & stand liable to the further Censure of the Court.
- 41y Its agreed upon that the Milner shall take for his wast & towle 5d of meale, & wt euer is wanting more is to be mayd good by him, & hee to stand lyable to the Corts censure upon Just & sufficient testimony of the same.
- 5ly Its agreed that all pitts & hooles are to bee filled up & trees removed, wch ly neare the way within a fortnitts tyme or elde they are to pay 10s & bee lyable to the Censure of the Court.
- 6ly That all Creeks are free, only hee yt maks a ware therein is to haue in the first place the benefitt of it in Fishing tyme & soe others may sett a ware either aboue or below & enioy the same liberty.

It is agree upon by the Inhabitants of Exeter Let every man shall Fence the next spring a generall fence every man an equall p portion according to the quality of ground lyng within the fence by the middle of the secund moenth wch will be 1641; and wt damagecan be mayd to appear for the want of a sufficient Fence hee yt ows it is to make it it good, & if the sayd Fence bee not sett vp at the day appoynted every day after hee yt is behind hand herein shall pay Five Shillings a day

Orders mayd & agreed vpon at Exeter houlden this 3d day moenth 12th 1640.

Its agreed vpon yt Mr William Hilton is to enjoy those two marshes in & Oyster River wch formerly he hath had possession of & still are in his possession & the other marsh wch Mr Gibbies doth wrongfully detayne from him with the rest of those marshes weh formerly hee hath mayd use of soe fare forth as they may bee for the publique good of this plantation, And soe much of the upland adioryning to them as shall bee thought conveigent by the neighbores of Oyster River, who are belonging to this body.

It is further agreed vponyt vpon or former agrement every one shall fence his p portion of ground & if any refuse, whosever will fence it shall have Whosoeur

use of it till they bee fully satisfyd, if it bee ould ground, & if it bee new hee shall have it for his payens

ere As it was formerly agreed vpon in generall y all the Toune should generall fence & w they come to fence prticularly others should doe as much for them in fencing as they did for y outsids who vpon farther consideration is not thought equall yrfore now it is agreed yt w wee come to fence in particular y it must bee putt to the consideration of two indiferent men w y fence is worth by those where the fenced the out side, is to bee mayd good unto them again by such as it appertains two.

Its likewise agreed that whoseeuer buyes the Indean ground by way of purchase is to tender it first to the towne, before they are to make p per use of it in prticular to themselves.

Orders mayd by the Court at Exeter, moenth First, day the 12th 1640 (1641?)

Imp<sup>r</sup>. where as the high wayes by vertue of a forme<sup>r</sup> order were to bee in breadth 3 pole at the least, yet notwithstanding they are straythed in diverse parces, wee doe therefore here agains order that they should bee rectifyd & mayd the full breadth as aforesayd, betwixt this & the middle of the secund moenth weh shall be in the years of or Lord 1642, & alsoe such ground as is taken in contrary to order, to bee rectifyd within the sayd tyme.

Orders mayd by the Court at Exeter d: 30: m: First, 1641

It is agreed upon yt all the Swine aboue \(\frac{1}{2}\) a yeare ould and vp-wards are to bee sent downe into the great bay by the 10th day of secund Moenth, & wt Swine are found in the towne after \(\frac{1}{2}\) yt tyme aboue yt age, wt hurt they doe in a sufficient Fence, there owners are to make it good.

Its further agreed that yt according to former orders yt all are to have y' fences finished of y' home lotts by the middle of yt next moenth, or otherwise to stand to ye perill yt may ensue.

Its agreed that none but inhabitants of the towne shall paint w hin the townes libertys w hout there consent.

Whereas the freemen of Exeter have mayd choyse of Mondam Richard Bulgar to bee Leefetenant of ye band of Souldgers in Exeter, & pr sented to ye court houlden at Exeter d:30: moenth First 1641, I the Ruler of the sayd plantation doe confirme the sayd choyse & doe further grant yt the sayd Mr Richard Bulgar shall bee enstauled & confirmed Leeftenant by the freemen ye next trayning day.

Nicholas Needham

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An order mayd by the (Court at Exeter, d: 10th.m: 4th 1641

Its ordered that Goodman shall allow the Indeans one bushell of corne for y labor & wch was spent by y in replaynting of y corne of y s wch was spoyld by his corne, (evidently wrongly written for swine--transcriber) & hee to make up y lose at haruest, according as y corne may bee judged worse then there corne wch was nev hurt.

Whereas the freemen of Exeter haue mayd choyse of Thomas Wardell to bee Sargiant of the band of Souldgers in Exeter & pr sented to ye Court houlden at Exeter d: 30: moenth First 1641, I the Ruler of the sayd plantation do confirme the sayd choyse & d(oe further) grant yt the sayd Thomas wardell shall bee enstaled by the the next trayning day.

Nicholas Needum

An order mayd at the Court at Exeter the last day of June 1641 it is agreed upon that there shall be none accusations deulged or spread abroud of aney parsons or parsons but what there be proued by the mouth of to or three witneses for they that shall so doe shall be liable to the Court Sensur this is not in pount of damidegs of trespas but in point of slanders in a mans good name.

(There follow on this page three paragraphs containing only the beginnings of lines and furnishing too little material for a guess as to the meaning of the paragraphs. The lower right hand corner of the page has been torn out. The last paragraph contains lines of the greatest length and runs thus:)

What is typed below has been recovered from the page itself and from the copy of the records made by "dward Smith, in accordance with the vote of the town passed march 11, 1678. This copy by Edward Smith is to be found on pages 1-28 of the second town book.)

The Elders Oath, ye 4th Day, 5th Mo, 1639

You shall sweare by the great and dreadfull name of the high God maker & Govner of heavem and earth and by the Lord Jesus Christ you Prince of the K ings and Rulers of the earth that in his name and feare you will Rule and Governe this his people according to the righteous will of Gods Ministeringe Justice and Judgmt upon the workers of iniquity and Ministering due incurridgmt and Countinance to well doers--protecting of people so farre as in you by the helpe of (God) lyeth, from formen Annoyance and inward disturbance that they may live a quiett and peacable life in all godlyness and honesty. Soe God bee helpful and gratious to you and yors in Christ Jesus.

## The oath of the People

Weedoe here sweare by the Great and dreadfull name of ye high God maker and Gouern of Heaven & earth and by the Lord Jesus Xt ye King & Savior of his people that in his name & fear wee will submitt or selves to be ruld & gouerned by, according to ye will & word of God and such holsome Lawes & ordinances as shall be derived theire from by or honrd Rulers and ye Lawfull assistance with the consent of ye people and yt wee will bee ready to assist them by the helpe of God in the administracon of Justice and prervacon of peace with or bodys and goods and best endeauor according to God, soe God protect & saue us and ors in Christ Jesus.

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Cort at Exeter mth: 5: d: 10th 1642

The Censure of the Court against Thomas Weight for contentious Carages & speeches against both y Court & the magestrate with 100 is yt hee is to bee fined 20sh & to pay all Court charges besids, & his liberty to bee taken away as hee is a freeman.

Its agreed yt all maner of cattle are to have keepers a days & are to bee looke to of nights & kept vp, if any damage come by any, answerable satisfaction mst bee mayd.

It is ordred by the Court houldne att Exeter the 6th day of the third mo 1643 That mr Thomas Rashley shall have givene vnto him for A house lott that peece of Land wch lyeth betweene Grifing Mountegue his lott and Mr Stanyon his Creeke, Conteyneing 14 or 16 Akers be more or lese, only excepteing 2 Akers and A halfe for A loot for Grifing Mountegue next to the Creeke.

It is farther ordred by the Court Aboue Named that Thomas Wardall William Winborne Samuell Walker and Robert Reade shall have libertey and Athoretey to searche into the howse or howses of Aney p son or p sones wi(thin our) Jurisdictiones And to take into theire Custodey(and make) sale of Aney such Corne as they shall find in ther (houses which is more then the ptie or pties shall have ne(ed) of for theire one Families till harvist next provided th(at) the pties Above Named make good pay for the sd Co(rne) and as good A pryce as it is gimerally sould for in (the) Rivore and their pties to dispose of such Corne taken by them who such poore people as stands most in ne(ed) of it for the best pay they Can Make and att the fir(st) price weh the pties Above named bye it att.

3<sup>d</sup> 19 day (44)

Its agreed that the tommsmen shall pocure a bridg ouar lamprill Riuar.

Its left to the 3 townsmen to purches mr Whelwrights howse with all lands belonging ther unto for the towne.

It is agred that all dogs shall be Clogd and sid lind\* in ye day and tid vp in the night and if aney dogs shall be found trespasing in the lots they that shall find them may showt them or folow them to the howse to which the dog doth belong and Charge 5° vpon the onar of that dog or bitch which shall be leved by order from the townsmen & halfe the fine to faul to ye towne and halfe to the partie that takes that dog and the trespas to be Judged by tow men and the trespas to be paid for.

Whereas a certen combination was made by vs the brethren of the church of wth the rest of the Inhabitants bearing date Mon. 5th d.4, 1639.w<sup>ch</sup> afterwards vpon the instant request of some of the brethren was altered & put into such a forme of wordes wherein howsoever we doe acknowledge the Kings Majesty our dread Soveraigne & our selves his subjects: yet some expressions are contained therein wch may seeme to admit of such a sence as somewhat derogates from that due Allegiance wch we owe unto his Highnesse quite contrarry to our true intents and meanings: Wee therefore doe revoke, disanull, make voyd & frustrate the said latter combination as if it had never beene done & doe ratify, confirme & establish the former, wch wee onely stand unto as being in force and vertue, the wch for substance is here set downe in manner and forme following.

(There follows the combination in Whelewright's hand, with the original signatures of those who signed it, as reproduced in the frontispiece to Bell's History of Exeter. The last name given in this list, Robert Smith, does not appear in the original on page 15 of the first book of town records. Appearing Mr Bell introduced to from the first book of town and by Edward Smith about 1878, in which "Rebert Smith, his mark" is appealed to the name "willia Mandell" the last as the original list records, but at the top of page 16, where luckily it has been preserved.)

At the same meeting there was chosen to run the line betweene Exeter Falls & Lamprey river falls Nicholas Smith John Bean John Yong with John Folsom Senior. If any of these men above wrytten refuse to goe he is to pay ten shillings.

At the same meeting there was chosen John Gilman, Jonathan Thing William More Leiftenant Hall Moses Gilman Nicholas Lissen Sam: Levit, Peter Folsome, Robert Smart, with John Folsom Senior one of the towne measurers, to run the line betweene Dover and Exater, and what the aforesaid men shall determine of or the major pte of them, in runing of the said lyne, to be of force, and to stand to as good effect, as if the whole towne of Exeter had beene p sent

There was discovered by John Folsom Senior upon the measuring of the lyne betweene Dover & Exeter a parcell of meadow conteing to the quantity of twelve or sixteene acres, lying westward from Mr Symonds mill about two mile betweene Lampry river and Dover lyne.

Whereas there is likely to be great damage to the towne by laying loggs on the meeting house hill by beating downe the banks of it. It is therefore ordered that there shalbe no more loggs layd betweene Nicholas Norris his howse and the south east syde of the hill, upon forfeitur of wahat timber shalbe layd their, to be forthwith seised on by the constable for the use of the towne.

Whereas there is great annoyance in high ways, and in some places loggs left very dangerous for travailers. It is therefore ordered that there shalbe a sufficient high way for a Loaden cart to pase in all high ways in the convenient places and whosever shal block up the high ways see as a cart cannot con veniently passe, or what tymber shal lye dangerous shalbe forfeit to the towne, and the constable forthwith to take it away by distress.

It is ordered that no man shall receive any p son or psons into towne without the consent of the select men, or security for to free the towne from any charge that may ensue thereby, upon twenty shillings a month forfeiture, to be taken by the constabel as soone as it is forfeited and also that no man shall some to inhabit by purchase or other waye without the consent of the select men Apon the same penalty.

And for the farther prosecution for of this order it is agreed that Sam: Levit, and John Wedgwood, shall have full power and alsoe is now given, that in case they shall find that there be any transgressors of this order, to sease upon such delinquents, and for their paines, one halfe of the overplus to be their fees, and the other halfe to returne to the townes use.

At the same tawas meeting it was alsoe ordered, that what pine trees are already fallen, the fellers of them have liberty for one yeeres space to carry them away, but in case they neglect that tyme, it shalbe in the liberty of any other of those to whom the mills appertaine to convey them away to their owne use of their mills, and from this tyme forward whoever they be that shall fall any pine trees, and shall not carry them away within three months tyme, they shalbe forfeited to him that takes them away, provided alwayes that they be for the use of the owner of one of the mills.

It was further ordered at the same meeting that whatever person shall fell any pine tree (except for canoes masts building) and shall not improve it, and bring it to the use of the mills to which the priviledge of the timber is granted, for every tree soe fallen shall forfeit ten shillings to the towne.

At a meeting of the Select men of Exeter March 26 (75)

It is ordered that Mr Scammon shalbe surveyor of the high ways upon the eastward syde of the river, and shall have ful power to warme the inhabitants and all psons on that syde of the river that are liable by law to come into the high ways till they be repayred, and to keepe a just account of the labour, and to return it to the select men and upon refusal of any that shall not come into the wayes according to the surveyors order, shall forfeit fyve shilling, whereof halfe shall belong to the surveyor.

Alsoe It is ordered that John Folsom Senior shalbe surveyor for the Westerne syde of the river, and hath the same power as above expressd, upon the same penalty to be paid in the same manner as above, and to give the same account of their labor to the select men.

It is ordered that Cornelius Lary shall take care conserning the swine rooting up the meadows, and shall have halfe of the fine for his labour, he either informing the owner of the meadow or the owner of the meadow informing him, that so upon their complaint to the select men or the major pte of them, a warrant may be issued out to the constable, to distrein five shillings for every swine, that is not sufficiently ringd, found rooting upon the meadows, and the owners of the swine shalle liable to make good all damages to the owners of the meadow.

It is ordered that Christian Dolhoffe & Philip Carte shalbe vewers of fenses for this yeere, and that fenses shalbe set up by the 20th of Aprill next that are in common.

Edward Gilman is chosen for measuring of boards, and for any that desire him, they are to allow him twelve pence p. thousand, for what he measures & takes account of, and further he is made choice of for sealing of weights & measures
